GUEST SPEAKERS – KATHY & ALISON



Our guest speakers this week were Kathy and Alison from East Adelaide Domestic Violence Service.

Kathy, Program Manager, spoke first. She told us that 95% of domestic violence victims are women and children and their organisation exclusively assists this group, as the cost of duplication to help men would be prohibitive.

In addition to donations from the community they have government assistance (30% Federal and 70% State). They have a Domestic Violence Helpline that operates 24/7. Calls are assessed by experts who can immediately provide shelter at motels. East Adelaide is one of five centres in the metro area. They are always full and sometimes woman and children can spend up two months Alison & Kathy with Pres. Pauline in a motel waiting for a vacancy in a centre.

Prevention is better than cure, and deteriorating behaviour can be a flag for SAPOL's Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme for a background check which is then passed on to the inquirer. Accommodation in a centre is between five to six months. There are another 33 houses in the community which can then house a woman and family for one or two years. There is a chronic shortage of accommodation which Alison later said was the worst she has seen in her 40 years and then top that off with the skyrocketing cost of living.

Some of the DV programs are: Early Access, Connection, Safer at Home, Safe and Well Kids, Multi Agency (e.g. a dedicated SAPOL member on site at the Marion main office). Kathy told us that DV is everyone's business and is not exclusive to lower socio-economic areas. Twenty five percent of victims come from diverse ethnic backgrounds while 40% are from the Aboriginal community. Much of the funding goes to Starter Packs, which go with the women once they leave the centre.

Alison continued the address with some troubling statistics. One woman in Australia is killed by DV every four days. Women are more likely to be assaulted during pregnancy or when trying to separate. In a woman's reproductive years, DV will be the most likely cause of her injury. Most assaults are not reported. The annual cost of DV is \$26 Billion.

Most DV is invisible, linked to male power and control. It's a slow wearing down of the spirit, which often creates mental health issues. 'Why not just leave?' Reasons for staying can be love, fear, belief he will change, lost confidence, support of the children, financial loss.

Alison talked about Coercive control, a form of domestic abuse, involving the ongoing or repeated pattern of controlling another person's behaviour. This type of abuse isn't always physical; it commonly consists of emotional or mental tactics to isolate, manipulate, threaten and control a person.

These actions can be subtle and hard to identify, but they cause just as much harm as any other form of domestic violence.

In addition to the staff, East Adelaide DVS has 30 volunteers along with support from service clubs like ours.

QUIZ QUESTION

The Aurora has been in the news quite a bit lately. Who named the Aurora and/or how was the name derived?



Answer: Galileo named the Aurora Borealis in 1619. He chose the Roman goddess of the dawn Aurora and the Greek God of the north wind Boreas to create the name. Of course, at the time only the northern hemisphere was known, and the Aurora Australis (meaning Southern in Latin) came later.

Fun facts about Auroras:

- Cave paintings in France dating back 30,000 years depict Auroras.
- They happen continuously, but once every 11 years the sun has a special phase that makes them much more intense. We are in one of those phases.
- We are lucky we have an atmosphere to protect us because the solar particles that cause them are travelling around 2000km/second and probably would not do you much good if they hit you.
- The magnetic field of the Earth draws the solar particles towards the poles, thus concentrating them there.
- The northern and southern Auroras are identical, but may happen at slightly different times due to the tilt of the Earth
- Green and red colours are derived from the solar particles hitting Oxygen and blue and violet from hitting Nitrogen
- The northern Aurora is often pictured in green simply because some places are further north and green is the lower part of the Aurora; if you see other colours, you are further away and seeing more Aurora overall.
- Most planets have Auroras, but planets with high magnetic fields are more prolific. Jupiter has a magnetic field 20,000 times stronger than Earth and thus has far brighter and stronger Auroras
- Mars and Venus also have Auroras even though they have a low magnetic field, which is a bit of a mystery.
- Norwegian Scientist Kristian Birkeland theorised what caused Auroras in the early 20th Century, but his theory wasn't proven correct until well after he died in 1917.
- A royal astronomer under Babylon's King Nebuchadnezzar inscribed a report on the Aurora into a tablet dated to 567 BC.
- A Chinese report dated to 193 BC also mentions the Aurora.
- The Vikings celebrated Auroras because they believed it was a sign that Odin had sent the Valkyries to take the fallen souls to Valhalla. The glow was a reflection from the Valkyries armour.
- Other Nordic legends were that the glow was the breath of fallen soldiers.
- Swedish fishermen believed that the Aurora was a sign that huge schools of herring were swimming nearby.
- Icelandic people believed that Auroras relieved the pain of childbirth, but the mother had to avert her gaze otherwise the child would be born cross-eyed!
























LIGHTSVIEW RETIREMENT VILLAGE CELEBRATE WORLD MENTAL HAT DAY


