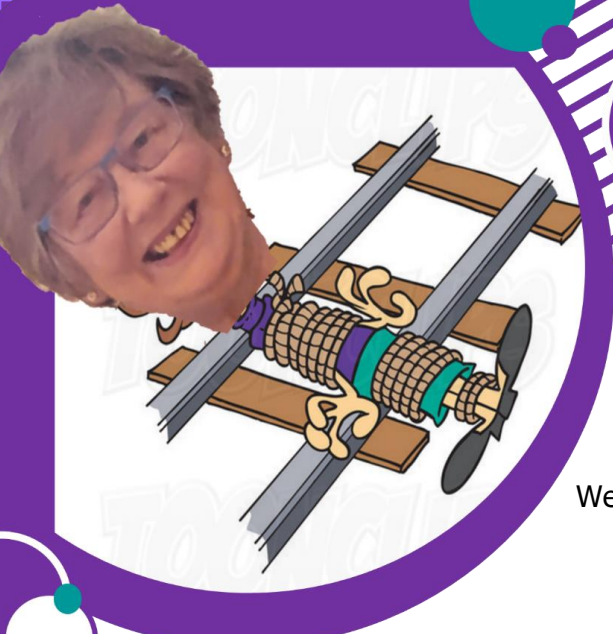




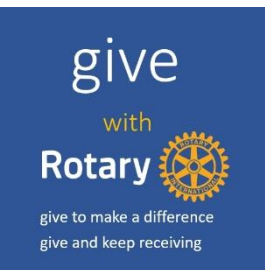

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT



The **Rotary Club of Magill Sunrise** has served our local community and overseas projects for over 28 years. We have contributed to students' educational success, supported victims of Domestic Violence, the Operation Flinders youth programs, the homeless, the establishment and improvement of Nightingale Park. And we have given to health programs including training four midwives for the fistula

hospital in Ethiopia, helping to eradicate Leprosy in East Timor and to stamping out Polio around the world. There has been a myriad of other donations to worthy causes; all from the proceeds of our monthly market.

**It is all part of giving to make a difference.**

This week with the money raised at the November market we were able to donate \$1,000.00 to ShelterBox to assist with their marvellous work in providing shelter to displaced people. They have provided shelter to over 2.5 million people so far and when people are left with nothing more than what they stand up the gift of a ShelterBox is a place to feel safe after days or weeks of fear. It offers protection from harsh weather, provides privacy, and helps to preserve dignity. It's a space to heal from trauma.

Recovery from a disaster or conflict doesn't happen overnight, but a dry and warm place to sleep, prepare meals, and be with family is the vital first step and that is why the work of ShelterBox is so important and we are proud to support them.

Community wise this week we helped in the local community by manning the BBQ at the Morialta Secondary College Sports Day. My thanks go to Robyn and Graham Holcroft, Molly Sweeney, Lindsay Davis and Colin Hill for stepping up to the plate literally.

We are now embarking on building teacher accommodation at the Lirhanzo Children's Village in Zimbabwe. See us at the December market and buy a brick or two, because "Education is the movement from darkness to light" and a way out of poverty.

## GUEST SPEAKERS INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE "ONE BRICK AT A TIME"

Our guest speakers this week were our newly formed International Projects Committee. Our enthusiastic new members are promoting our new international campaign.

Dr Godfrey Sibanda is a SA GP with close connections to Lirhanzo Children's Village (LCV), as he was born in Chikombedzi, Mwenezi District in Zimbabwe.

Godfrey is also a Director of the registered charity, Aid For Africa Down Under (AFADU). Alice Josaf has sponsored a child through AFADU and run fundraisers for LCV for several years. They have both brought their connection and passion to our club. Suzette Coat has been involved in numerous refugee and charity support activities over recent years and has been yearning for an international project she could engage with.

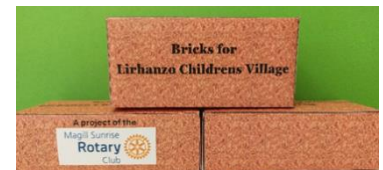
There is also a Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS) project that supports LCV partnered with Rotary Club of Masvingo, District 9210. It is possible to make tax deductible donations via RAWCS.

Our focus in developing this project was to have something tangible and achievable, before hopefully, tackling a larger project. So, when Godfrey explained to us about the need for teacher housing, we saw this as an achievable challenge.

LCV has been operating since 2004. The children there have received a primary school education. Godfrey explained that this year the Zimbabwean government approved a high school and sent five teachers. Unfortunately, the government overlooked the need to provide housing for these teachers. So, this is a clear need to be met. We see this as an ongoing and sustained relationship with LCV, as they will need more teacher accommodation in the years to come.

To raise the funds to build a teachers house we have resolved to sell bricks. We have set a fundraising target of \$20,000, therefore we need to sell 4,000 bricks at \$5 each. People may buy as many bricks as they like. For the addition of \$2, people can buy a gift card to give as a gift. This is modelled on other charity gift cards.

Those who purchase 100 bricks can have their name on a plaque on the house. We also have some cute, folded paper bricks for purchase (we just need generous donors to provide a bit of filling for our bricks).



We are planning to promote this fundraising drive amongst other Rotary clubs, the community and local schools.

We are excited by the possibility of community building, especially with the potential of encouraging local schools to hold casual days to buy bricks. How cool would it be for a local school to have their name on the plaque on the teachers' house, showing their support for education in an African community!

We hope that our club and others might seize the opportunity to do good, by buying a few bricks for their friends this Christmas, and beyond.....

## QUIZ QUESTION

**Has anyone fallen from the Leaning Tower of Pisa and died?**

**Answer:** Yes, it is estimated that between 200 – 250 people have fallen and died



### Curious facts about the tower:

- Construction started in 1173 and took 200 years to complete.
- About 5 million people visit every year.
- The seven bells have not been rung since last century as engineers believe they contribute to leaning.
- The tower was built with money stolen by sacking the city of Palermo in 1063.
- Pisa literally means "marshy land" in Greek, but the engineers didn't note that. It started leaning when the 2<sup>nd</sup> story was built, so construction was halted for about 100 years.
- There are two other leaning towers in Pisa.
- The tower has leaned in different directions at various times.
- At worst the tower leaned 5.5 degrees until stabilized in the 1990s at 3.97 degrees
- Mussolini was ashamed of it and considered it a national disgrace and tried to fix it, but made it much worse.
- The allies intended to destroy it in WW2 as they moved through and removed all lookout points; however, impressed by its beauty they spared it.

**The dedication ceremony for our pole has been rescheduled until the New Year.**

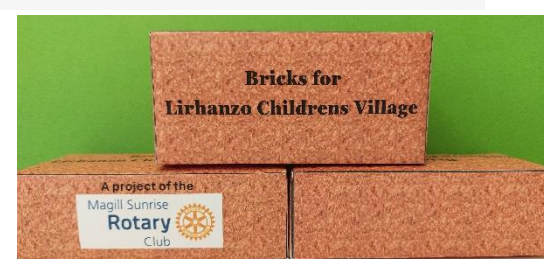
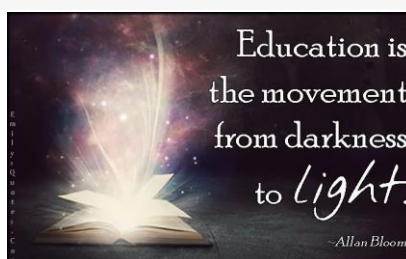
Please keep an eye out for the new date and join us in Nightingale Park to inspire peace on earth.

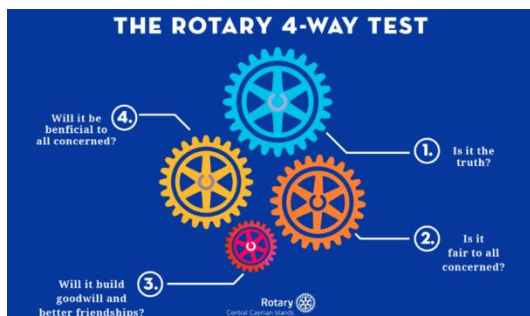

## United Nations Climate Change

### Green Corner – COP29

The international 'Conference of Parties' (COP) series provides a multi-lateral forum to make decisions about how to address the climate change crisis. This year COP29 is being held in Baku, Azerbaijan. One of the objectives of this year's meeting, held in a 'petroleum-rich'-state, is to identify sources of funding to help less developed nations to reduce dependence on fossil fuels. Rotary International is a participant at the COP series of meetings as it impacts every one of the seven focus areas including Peace, Disease prevention, Water, Economic Stability and the Environment.

Rotary's world-wide **Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group (ESRAG)** has provided an outline of how Rotary International is already trying to address the most pressing issues ([COP 29 Priorities and How ESRAG is Leading the Charge on Climate Action - ESRAG - Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group](#) ) This link provides further guidance on how you can contribute to the ESRAG's objectives.

At a Club and personal level **what can you do?** There are so many opportunities. For instance, check your council waste management policies regularly. The technology is rapidly changing, and what goes into what bin and what is recyclable will vary. Please keep up to date with your local council.

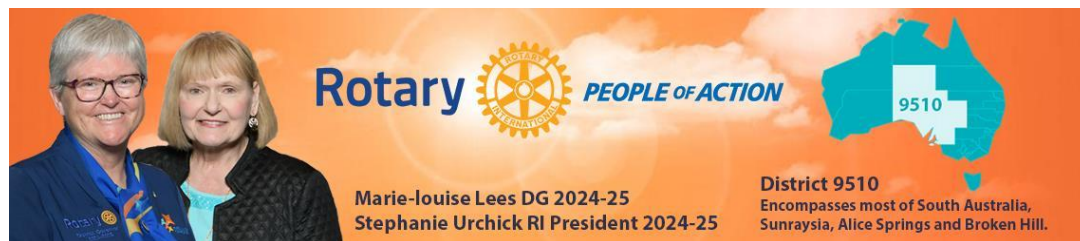
