

Youth had its say at this week's meeting. First up Scarlet, Ben, Rohan and Noah: students from Norwood International High School (NIHS) brought us up to speed on the Malta ANZAC Costal Regatta.

HE MAGIC

In 2023 a team from NIHS participated in formal activities and competition in an international costal rowing regatta. Teams from New Zealand and Malta also competed.

NIHS is raising funds to once again attend this regatta in 2025. Why Malta and Anzac Day? Well, teacher and rowing coach, Emily Laidin along with the students told us of the construction of Australia Hall in Malta in WW1 when Aussie solders were

stationed in Malta. Australia Hall fell into disrepair and was destined for demolition until its historical significance was recognised and a commemorative costal regatta was organised.

Surf boats are the go in Australia, but not so in the Mediterranean where smaller boats that can take up to four rowers and a cox compete in spring events of 250m slalom courses. Our club will be donating \$500 to assist the team.

Cut off from mobiles for three days and two nights, the girls were part of 35 mixed gender participants, aged 14 to 17. Lack of phones enabled more time to making new friends, which has carried over.

Workshops and games dominated. One workshop that was of value was listing 10 things that they could control and 10 things that they couldn't. Another workshop they enjoyed was the Puzzle Workshop. Fun things were games like Pictionary and charades; dishing out fines for good and bad behaviour was another fun thing.

Overall, Annabel and Aaliya found the program enriching and lived up to its name.

QUIZ QUESTION

What significant event happened in Australia on this day, 03 December, in 1854?

Answer: The Eureka Stockade



Interesting facts about the Eureka Stockade

- American author Mark Twain visited Ballarat in the late 1800s and remarked in his journal "I think it may be called the finest thing in Australasian history. It was a revolution small in size; but great politically; it was a strike for liberty, a struggle for a principle, a stand against injustice and oppression.... It is another instance of a victory won by a lost battle".
- The original Eureka flag is very large at 2.6M high and 4M wide.
- Although the battle eventually happened in Ballarat, in the year leading up to it large protests were also held in Bendigo and Beechworth.
- Governor Charles Latrobe implemented the strict gold licensing regime in 1851 that became increasingly onerous. It was designed to discourage people leaving Melbourne to become miners.
- By mid-1854 in the wake of protests, moderation was passed by the Victorian government, but had to be sent to England for approval.
- Sir Charles Hotham took up as Governor in June 1854 and despite knowing the relaxation of the laws was coming, doubled down on compliance including weekly license hunts, then doubling it to twice weekly in September.
- In October 1854 the Ballarat miners protested after a hotelier was acquitted of murdering a miner and a sympathiser was arrested on trumped up charges.
- The Riot Act was read, but the miners overpowered the Police and burnt down the Eureka Hotel.
- On 11th November 1854 the Miners Reform League was formed in Ballarat after 10,000 miners gathered at Bakery Hill.
- On 29th November 1854 again around 10,000 miners gathered at Bakery Hill where the Eureka flag was raised, and Peter Lalor was elected as leader.
- Lalor read the Eureka oath on bended knee "We swear by the Southern Cross to stand truly by each other and fight to defend our rights and liberties.".
- The crowd then retreated to Eureka where some assembled the stockade.
- At 3.30am on Sunday 3rd December 1854, 276 troops were deployed to overtake the stockade outnumbering the rebels camped there 3:1. The rebels quickly ran out of ammunition and the heavily armed troops routed those who didn't run for it. The battle lasted 15 minutes.
- It is believed that 22 diggers and 5 troopers were killed, but the exact figure is still a mystery
- As word filtered back to Melbourne thousands gathered in Swanston St to protest the Governor's actions.
- The exact location where the stockade was built in Ballarat is unknown.
- Thirteen miners were arrested and charged with treason. In 1855 all received a pardon and were released.
- Peter Lalor was elected to the Victorian parliament in 1856.







ICE BREAKER

How would you know you are in a typical SA bakery?

There were many great suggestions such as the presence of German cakes, particularly Bienenstich (Bee Sting), Cornish Pasties, Frog Cakes and Kitchener Buns. Vanilla Slices were also mentioned - although they are not unique to SA, the presence of coconut on top of the icing is apparently a peculiarity mainly found in SA, so definitely deserves a mention.





PRESIDENT'S - "DID YOU KNOW?"

In Japan, eating Kentucky Fried Chicken on Christmas Eve is a beloved tradition, thanks to a successful marketing campaign in the 1970s. The American fast-food chain reportedly sells 10 times more on 24 December than on any typical day.



Every Christmas season an estimated 3.6 million Japanese families treat themselves to fried chicken from KFC. Orders for 25 December must be placed months in advance and people queue up outside takeaway outlets.

Japan Airlines often serves KFC inflight during the Christmas season.


