Rotarians can and do make a difference

GUEST SPEAKERS – CHARLOTTE REIMER & JANET JACKSON

Our guest speakers this morning were Charlotte Reimer and Janet Jackson from local resident action group Magill Matters. Charlotte started writing to various decision makers for more than a year expressing concerns about the future of the Magill UniSA site. The Magill Matters Facebook group was created in July 2024 when it became apparent that the UniSA campus was going to close and the future of the site was in serious doubt, particularly the trees, open spaces, Third Creek environs and the historic Murray Park House. To ensure good outcomes it was important to more widely engage a group of local residents.

THE MAGIC

They noted that in the Campbelltown Council area there used to be an average of 30% site coverage on house blocks, but this has now risen to 70% on the average new build and can be up to 95%. This means that there is no space for trees, and it creates a "heat island" effect from the hard surfaces and buildings. Coupled with a high rate of infill, Campbelltown is rapidly losing its trees (ed: property renewals are higher in Campbelltown than many other parts of Adelaide due to a combination of property prices, the age of housing stocks, higher building degradation due to soil movement, distance to the city, good public transport, excellent local schools, and the quality of local parks and sports facilities).

They noted that apart from shade, trees have several obvious benefits such as habitat for animals and birds, plus mental & physical health benefits through a calming effect. There are several koalas that make their home at the Magill UniSA site and are well loved by local residents. The site is very popular and is effectively a de-facto local park, which is important in an area with little open space.

The Magill Matters group now has over 550 members and is engaged with key stakeholders such as state and local politicians. They are advocating for a redevelopment at the Magill UniSA site that "respects environmental preservation while aligning with community needs and the government's objectives." They wish to "find a balanced approach that benefits everyone." They are particularly concerned that the site may become very high density covering a large proportion of the site, that may include tall buildings. The Hamilton Hill development was mentioned as an undesirable precedent and a potential example of what will happen.

The State Government department, Renewal SA, are the current owners of the site and are running a community consultation seeking community input on what the site should look like. The Magill Matters group believes that the site provides a "once in a lifetime unique opportunity to create something exceptional... to become a model project for the Government." They believe that if the site is sold to private developers it will result in poor outcomes and they would like to see Renewal SA work with a design firm like the current landscape architects, Oxigen, to develop it themselves (ed: similar to the way Lochiel Park was done).







Magill Sunrise Rotary has a long and proud association with the location having been heavily involved with Nightingale Reserve that borders this development. We have been asked to participate in the consultation, spread the word, advocate for sustainability, and to join the Magill Matters Facebook page to stay informed. We are key stakeholders and given that this issue goes to the heart of Rotary's Environmental Focus

Area, the very sensible discussions going on are well worthy of participation.

It was an excellent update, and we greatly appreciated both Charlotte and Janet coming to visit us and inform us of this important issue. Simon Brewer

Interesting facts about the Brittanica

- It is a private company, not published by a university as many think, and has changed ownership seven times in its history
- First published in Edinburgh, Scotland in three volumes
- Second edition was 10 volumes
- Fourth edition (1801-1810) was 20 volumes
- The 15th edition in 2010 was the last printed edition with 32 volumes and 32,640 pages
- It is now hosted entirely online
- It employs 100 full time editors and has more than 4,000 contributors
- Contributors have included Albert Einstein, Marie Curie, Leon Trotsky and Isaac Asimov
- George Bernard Shaw claimed to have read the entire 9th edition except for the science articles
- Sometimes it has been controversial, such as in the late 1700s refusing to accept Newton's Law of Gravity and not publishing it, and stating in the 9th edition that "The Bible was not historically accurate"
- In 1994 it debuted the first internet-based encyclopaedia
- Since 1901 it has been US owned and based




