Well done Suzette on a most entertaining address.
















RCMS AWARDED A ROTARY CITATION FOR 2023-2024

MEET THE RI PRESIDENT – STEPHANIE URCHICK

Stephanie A. Urchick, of the Rotary Club of McMurray, Pennsylvania, USA, is President of Rotary International for 2024-25.

With the world facing incredible challenges, including the COVID-19 pandemic, disasters driven by climate change, and conflict in many regions, Urchick says Rotary's leaders can offer a vision and a plan for overcoming these challenges.

"Because Rotary operates in more than 200 countries and regions, it is vital to recognise that the organisation has the potential to become more efficient and effective by understanding and reacting to how regional differences affect the way Rotarians work together to address providing service, promoting integrity, and advancing world understanding, goodwill, and peace," Urchick says.

She is partner and chief operating officer of Doctors at Work LLC, a consulting and training company and holds a doctorate in leadership studies from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. She is active on numerous community boards and committees and has been honoured by organisations including Zonta International and the Sons of the American Revolution.

A Rotary member since 1991, Stephanie Urchick has travelled to Vietnam to help build a primary school and to the Dominican Republic to install water filters. She studies several Slavic languages, has mentored new Rotarians in Ukraine, and coordinated a Rotary Foundation grant project in Poland.

She has served Rotary in many roles, including as a director, Foundation trustee, and chair of the RI Strategic Planning Committee and the Foundation's Centennial Celebration Committee. She currently serves on the Election Review Committee and the Operations Review Committee and is a Rotary Foundation Major Donor and a member of the Bequest Society.

Music has been a touchstone throughout Urchick's life. Her dad played the accordion and led a polka band, the "Harmoneers", for more than 35 years. "I learned to polka before I learned to walk," she says. Urchick was a singer with her father's band and when she's in town, she sings with the Eastern Orthodox church choir directed by another of her cousins. "You know how some families get together and play cards?" she asks. "My father was a musician. My grandmother, my aunts, they were all singers. So, when we got together, we sang."

Urchick grew up in western Pennsylvania, near the border of West Virginia, a countryside of forests and farms in the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains. Both her maternal and paternal grandparents moved here from Eastern Europe (Poland, Slovakia, and Ukraine), settling down to take advantage of the jobs in the region's coal mines and steel mills. When she arrived in the United States, her mother knew one sentence: "Give me some potatoes."

As a child she devoured Nancy Drew mystery novels and dreamed of being a spy. "I was in this little place in Pennsylvania, and I really had never gone anywhere," she says. "I wanted to see the world." When she went to college, she channelled that desire into a major in international relations, with its focuses on history, political science, and languages. She studied Russian, Polish, Serbian, and Italian, on top of the French she'd learned in high school.

Given Urchick's background in international relations, her interest in peace as another of her priorities as president likely comes as no surprise. She encourages living The Four-Way Test, investing in a positive club culture, and engaging with Rotary Peace Centres as ways members can help spread the message of Rotary's commitment to peace. "We're not going to get a Nobel Peace Prize for stopping a war," Urchick says, "but we can use what we have in Rotary to make the world a better place."

OLYMPIC GOLD MEDALS AREN'T GOLD

The so-called "gold" medals that lucky athletes receive for coming first in their events may look gold, but they are mostly silver.

According to rules set by the IOC, gold medals must be plated with at least 6g of pure gold. Solid gold medals have not been used since 1912 at the Stockholm Olympics.
































ROTARY YOUTH PROGRAM OF ENRICHMENT (2024) For young people, aged 14-17

RYPEN is a three-day residential program of enrichment for young people aged 14 to 17.

Workshops

The program aims to provide opportunities for young people to develop important life-skills, and to assist them to progress their communication and leadership skills through a range of formal and informal activities.

Activities

Participants take part in a range of activities including:

- Ice-breakers
 Comedy skits
- Small group work
 - Career expos

Goal setting

Communication skills

Personal Development

Discussion forums

Experienced young facilitators will support and encourage participants in the program to develop their:

- Public speaking skills
 Teamwork
- Self-care and resilience
- Problem-solving Skills
- Beliefs and values

RYPEN'S focus is on assisting young people to become active and valuable members of society, and to develop their abilities as potential leaders.

Participants can seize the opportunity to develop leadership, communication and problem-solving skills, practice new behaviours, forge life-long friendships and challenge their personal belief systems and values.

Who is Eligible?

RYPEN is open to all young people aged 14 to 17 years who have an ambition to improve their interpersonal and leadership skills.

Details in Brief

- When / Where: RYPEN is held at Nunyara Conference Centre between Fri 1 Nov and Sun 3 Nov 2024.
- How to register: Any young person aged 14-17 can register their interest at <u>www.rypen9510.org</u>
- Applications are due: Monday 14 October 2024.
- RYPEN costs: Around \$425, but most young people will attend at no cost, fully sponsored by Rotary. Rotary Clubs may request a \$50 holding deposit which is fully refundable when the young person attends RYPEN.
- School involvement: Encourage young people to apply. Once a young person registers, Rotary finds a local Rotary Club to sponsor the applicant.
- Rotary involvement: Based on each applicant's registration details, their local Rotary Club will contact the
 student directly. The club may interview the applicant and ask to interview the applicant.
- Child Protection: RYPEN facilitators are aged between 19 and 24, have attended Rotary leadership training, have their Working With Children Check (WWCC) and have been vetted for suitability by Rotary.


